EDITORIAL.

It is with pleasure that the Editors publish this, the Second, Annual Handbook of the O.H. Club. It is, in essence, a similar publication to that for 1937-1938, for there is the same general plan and the same policy of "interest value" has been pursued. It is still our policy to report school affairs in the general and club affairs in the particular. A large number of members have sent us interesting notes about themselves or their contemporaries, and we shall be most grateful for similar contributions in future. One difference between this year's and last year's handbooks is in the design of the cover. Last year's may have been more attractive, but a criticism was put forward that it got dirty too easily, and so this year we have adopted a more sombre front.

We can report that the Cricket Tour and the Rugger Club are still thriving. Actually, we were not quite so successful during the cricket week as we have been in the past, but we all had a most enjoyable time, in spite of having to put up with almost continuous rain. Only one match suffered no interference at all. The rugger club is still finding it difficult to win many matches, though they did start off with two wins in the first two matches. Unfortunately, that record has since suffered, but it is no mean feat, in a club's second season, to be able to give good games to some of the best second-class sides in Monmouthshire, several of whom play in the Monmouthshire League. That the club is carrying on at all is due to the tremendous keenness of about a dozen real enthusiasts who have put their heart and soul into the club, and with such a nucleus, one has every hope for the success of the club in the future.

With the departure of the Secretary from Hereford, the club has appointed G. W. Hunt to be Joint Honorary Secretary, and the Rugger Club has appointed E. Rushworth as Secretary. With this strong link with the School, we hope that the club will thrive and that we shall all be kept in touch. We should have found it very difficult to have secured the services of keener or more efficient supporters of the Club to carry out these two jobs.

May we once more offer our best thanks to all those officers who have given their services so willingly and so effectively to the work of running the club—to our President, to the Treasurer, to the General Committee, to the organisers of the Dinners, to the secretaries of the Cricket tour and of the Rugger Club, to the district representatives and to the members who have come forward with information and other means of help. Thank you very much, gentlemen, and may we hope that your work will be rewarded by a really grand turnout at the Hereford Dinner in December, as well as at the "local" reunions.

SCHOOL NOTES.

The year past has been marked by the departure of two prominent members of the staff, both of whom will be greatly missed. At the end of the Easter Term, Mr. J. E. W. Scougall (O.H.) left to join the staff of Weymouth College, Dorset, and from his letters it can be gathered that he is enjoying life in his new post and finds the change not unsatisfactory.

Mr. J. B. Morgan left in July and is now Senior Mathematical Master at Liverpool Collegiate School. So far, however, he does not seem to have enjoyed the best of luck. Within a few days of taking up his new duties he was stricken with an acute appendix and, with complications intervening, the result has been an enforced absence of about nine weeks. "Cura ut valeas" is our message to him. His position in the School has been taken by Mr. L. S. Brown of St. John's College, Oxford. Mr. Scougall's post has been filled by Mr. F. L. Ward of Birmingham University.

The O.T.C. also has suffered through the almost simultaneous departure of its O.C., Capt. J. B. Morgan, and of Mr. Scougall who was second-in-command. O.H.'s, however, will easily realise that things might have gone much worse for the Corps if Capt. F. W. Brooks had not still been with us. He has very nobly taken over once more—like a giant refreshed, we gather—and Mr. P. Lewis has joined him as second officer. The new range was opened at the end of last term, we are glad to report.

We must not forget our congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Brooks on the birth of twins, and to Mr. Morgan, too, on the birth of a son.

School activities have taken their normal course and the usual standard of success has been maintained for the most part, as can be seen from the records. Thanks to Mr. Wardle, the crew, with their customary victories over Monmouth and Worcester, still hold pride of place among the School's representatives in sport. Marlow was a little disappointing, but one must not be too hard on the unfortunate boarder who, a week before the regatta, developed scarlet fever and thus caused a temporary cessation of training. First the keen sense of disappointment and then, after a couple of days of "easy-all," the natural excitement at finding that the journey to Marlow was possible after all must have had an adverse effect upon the crew. Mr. Wardle confesses to having had high hopes of bringing back the cup, once more.

It is gratifying that the stream of boys from the School to the Universities has not completely dried up. D. P. Williams is to be congratulated on gaining an Open Exhibition at Selwyn College, Cambridge-So, too, are P. Ll. Satriel and G. M. Evans on being awarded Somerset Thornhill Exhibitions to St. John's College, Cambridge and Brasenose College, Oxford, respectively.

PERSONAL NOTES.

The engagement is announced between John, elder son of Dr. F. C. Bullen, of Aberdare, South Wales, and the late Mrs. Bullen, and Margery, elder daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack West, of Wallington, Surrey.

The title of Professor Emeritus of the University of London was, on February 23rd conferred on Dr. A. E. Boycott, M.A., B.Sc., D.M., B.Ch. (Oxon.), F.R.C.P., F.R.S., formerly Graham Professor of Pathology at University College Hospital. Dr. Boycott died on May 12th., and an obituary notice is printed elsewhere.

In the Daily Mail of May 17th there appeared an article concerning the restoration of Louth Church. The rector of Louth is Canon H. P. W. Burton, and he has organised, with the help of the Daily Mail, a public appeal to restore the fine old church and its tower and spire, which resulted in a response of £5,000. Burton was at the school from 1902 to 1907, and was later President of the Cambridge Union Society.

In The Times of March 23rd, there appeared an account of a smash in which Major L. H. L. B. Burlton was very badly hurt. Burlton is an Old Herefordian who is now on the Southern Command Headquarters, and was flying his own plane at the time of the smash.

The late Professor E. J. Rapson left the residue of his property to St. John's College, Cambridge, directing that if the legacy amounted to more than £6,000 the College should pay £3,000 to the University for a Scholarship in Sanskrit, Pali or Avestan.

From The Times review of the Royal Academy :--

But owing to purchase by the President and Council of the Academy, under the Chantrey Bequest, his "Bird Nesting, Ludlow" hangs in the first room. J. S. W. Price (1908-1911) is now the Agent for the National Labour organisation in the West Bermondsey Division.



My dear Scougall,

I feel you must have been inundated with letters of congratulation from grateful O.H.'s on your production of the first Annual Handbook, but I am adding my widow's mite of praise as I feel that the more approbation you receive on the venture, the more confident you will be about continuing with the book with consequent benefit to us. As you very rightly point out, O.H.'s are far more interested in the doings of their contemporaries than in the exploits of Jones Minor on the cricket field and this interest is, I think, very amply catered for in the handbook.

I myself, for instance, have learnt that there is a small colony of O.H.'s in Singapore and I shall do my best to foregather with them ere long. I'm afraid that I am not yet in a position to enliven your correspondence columns with exciting stories of life in the tropics, as I have only been back from leave for a month, and a fortnight of that time has been spent in travelling in Sumatra and Siam. Incidentally, I made the journey by air, and saved a lot of time. This is the first time in my life that my time has been deemed so valuable that the extra cost of travelling by air was spent upon the saving of it. I have not had much time for sport since my return and have only managed to get in a few games of squash. However, a little later on the cricket season will be starting and I hope to do a little mildly at that. Its a funny thing that people at home think that everyone in this part of the world either sleep all the afternoon, or at any rate take what is known, I believe, as a siesta for about two hours at mid-day. The truth of the matter is that normal hours are 8.30 to 1. and 2 to 4.30, while lately I have been continuing until 7 at night, though this, I hope, is only temporary!

My dear Scougall,

Many thanks for sending me the 1st Annual Handbook of the O.H. Club. I think it is a marvellous idea, and is very interesting to those of us who are not in the Old Country. With any luck, I shall be home this summer, to do a tour of the Regimental Depot, in which case I shall lose no time in looking you all up.

I heard from Noel Becher and Freddie Powell-Jones at Christmas, and both seem to be flourishing. At the moment, I am away from the Regiment, up at Pachmarlie, on a small arms course. Work starts tomorrow, and continues until March 3rd. Life in India is not so bad as it is sometimes made out. The hot weather is a bit of a trial, especially at Nazirabad, where we had terrific thunderstorms. At the moment, the weather is good. There is quite a nip in the air in the mornings, and we actually have a fire for breakfast in the morning. Shooting has been quite good this cold weather. Our best bag has been 143 duck, snipe and teal to twenty guns. Snakes are plentiful during the monsoon, cobras and kraits in particular. After a bite from the latter, you last about twenty minutes. I killed one on my verandah last September.

How is the old school getting on? Bird-hunting still continues, I suppose, as of old. I expect cricket still maintains its "popularity." I run the regimental cricket, but I find it just as difficult to get the troops to turn out for games or practice as it was to get the chaps at school. Cricket at a small station like Nazirabad is very difficult, as there are few other stations with whom to arrange fixtures. In any case, one can never be certain what the ball will do, as the outfield is usually very rough.

All the best, and remember me to everyone.

My dear Ernie,

Forgive this scrawl, but the weather is "hotting" up just now, and its a bit of a fag to write "au propre." I'm leaning over a desk and scribbling away in the style affected by all the best beachcombers, shirtsleeves and shorts, "bas," "khatam" (as they say in Hindustani).

By the way, you will probably be pleased to hear that I have just passed my final Urdu (Hindustani) exam. That's the last of my compulsory ones over, apart from recurrent promotion exams. Also, I have been appointed local captain in order to hold down my Adjutant's job in Agra, so I've got a lot to be thankful about just now. I get only two months leave this year, but I am coming home for eight months next year (Feb. '39). I expect I shall go either to Japan or Australia—one can do both in two months in comfort from here. I should have about a month in Japan,

and lots of strange, exciting places like Bali-Bali en route, but there's a certain amount of racial tension at the moment! Australia takes longer to reach, of course, but I should have about 15 days at Melbourne or Sydney, as well as a grand voyage "over the line."

Dear Scougall,

It is possible that you have read in the paper of my appointment here, where I expect to be for six months. I am sorry that in consequence I shall not be able to join you on the cricket tour, but I hope to do so next year.

I am reminded to write to you by the enclosed cutting. Burlton, if I remember rightly, served in the regular army during the war and was severely wounded early on.

I have recently motored from Galveston to Los Angeles and back to New Orleans, whence I sailed from this country. Among other things, I saw the filming of a picture in Hollywood, but this was much less exciting than other experiences on the journey. I refer to visits to Boulder Dam, the Grand Canyon, an extinct volcano crater and lava flow, the meteor crater of North Arizona, the helium plant at Amarillo, Texas, and the East Texas Oil field. I nearly forgot to mention that on account of the agricultural situation in the United States the problem of oil erosion and water conservation also came under my study.......

I have a beautiful new car, a 1938 Packhard 30 h.p. convertible coupe. She is a most handsome looking outfit. In the States, on the wonderful roads, she can bat along at ninety, but my usual speed is around sixty, at which speed she just purrs along and is as steady as can be.

To-day and to-morrow are national holidays to celebrate their independence. In consequence, I have to wear full war paint and attend various functions. The following day I am going to spend at one of the United Fruit Company's plantations. It is about an hour and a half's

run by plane and then another hour by car, rail and ferry. I also go to the silver and gold mines to spend week-ends. Owing to the bad roads, I go everywhere by air. The springing is better.

I am now looking forward to going back to my proper post. It has been quite an interesting interlude, but I should have preferred not to have come. It is rather trying to be uprooted so constantly. I left Santos in November, went to Galveston in June 1937, came here in April of this year, return to Galveston in October and then come home on long leave in April of next year. Whilst I am a nomad by nature, this is just too much!

In the Handbook I saw the death of G. W. Finch among the obituary notices. This brings back to my recollection an interesting occasion on which I met him some years after leaving school. I was in the same form as he was in 1879. I left in 1881. It was in 1887 that we met again by accident in London. It was during the Trafalgar Square Riots at the time of the Dockers' Strike in November of that year. There were daily conflicts with the police. John Burns, Cunningham Graham and the other leaders were arrested and imprisoned. The disturbances continued for several weeks, and special constables were enrolled as a precautionary measure. I was playing rugby football at the time and thought it would be good for training to enrol. When I joined the ranks in Trafalgar Square, who should be next to me but G. W. Finch, whom I had not met

since I left school; so Old Herefordians meet sometimes under very unexpected circumstances.

To conclude, I may add that we had a very uneventful afternoon, both in the Square and in Kensington Gardens on the following Sunday. Hyde Park had become the rallying point of the rioters. Things afterwards quietened down, and then there were no more parades. From time to time I saw Finch in the neighbourhood of Whitehall. He had an office in Craig's Court near King Charles Statue, and I was in the Education Office, sitting in rooms overlooking Downing Street—a looker on at all sorts of exciting episodes and demonstrations prior to Gladstone's Home Rule Bill. But this is a digression on the part of—

IN MEMORIAM.

Dr. A. E. Boycott (O.H.).

Dr. A. E. Boycott, who died on May 12th at Ewen, Cirencester, was born on April 6th, 1877, and was the son of Mr. William Boycott, solicitor and one time Mayor of Hereford.

Boycott was at the School from 1886-1894. He gained his first colours for Cricket and Football and won the Symond's Sculls in 1893, having previously won the Junior Pairs in 1891. He was a Dean Langford

Scholar and in 1894 obtained an open classical scholarship to Oriel College, Oxford. He took the degrees of M.A., B.M., D.M., 1904, F.R.C.P. London in 1926. B.Sc., B.Ch., Oxon, 1902. In 1914 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society. He was also an Hon. Ll.D., McGill University and Sen. Demy., Magdalen College, 1901. Fraser Research School, 1899, afterwards St. Thomas' Hospital.

Elected a Fellow of Brasenose College, Oxford, 1903, he afterwards in 1907, became Lecturer on Pathology in Guy's Hospital Medical School and then Professor of Pathology, University of Manchester, 1912-1915.

He was afterwards Director of Pathological Department, University College Hospital and Graham Professor of Pathology, University of London, having held the latter post since 1915.

It was only in February last that he was elected Professor Emeritus of Pathology in the University of London.

In 1904 Boycott became a member of the scientific staff of the Lister Institute and his three years of work there will be remembered for fruitful researches carried out in collaboration with Professor Haldane and Captain G. C. C. Damant, a diving expert of the Royal Navy on diseases due to increased air pressure (Caisson disease).

During the war he served in the R.A.M.C. He carried out physiological investigations concerned with the effects on respiration of the substances used in gas warfare researches for which his earlier studies had peculiarly fitted him.

Among more general public work should also be mentioned his connexion from 1905 onwards with the Advisory Committee on plague investigation in India to which he acted as the first secretary.

He also served on the Medical Research Council and from 1925 was a member of the Governing Board of the Lister Institute.

His services to British Pathology included not only a lifetime of teaching and a long series of original investigations, chiefly devoted to the study of blood, its physiology, pathology and regeneration but also an active part in founding the Pathological Society of Great Britain and Ireland. To this Society and its offspring the Journal of Pathology and Bacteriology, Boycott was actively devoted. He was never absent from the meetings held twice a year alternatively in London and provincial schools and his service to the Journal included the duty of Editor for more than 25 years.

No account of Boycott would be complete without reference to what may be called his unofficial scientific work. His interest ranged over the whole of biological science and in many branches of natural history he was a recognised authority. For example, his work on the theory of genetics, as manifested in certain species of snails, is recognised as of the first order by those professionally engaged in that subject. These and similar studies filled his leisure time with great happiness and his love for the country was due not only to a great appreciation of natural beauty but also to an interested delight in the ordered variety and wealth of living things.

As a personality Boycott had great charm and belonged to those whose elements, to use an eloquent conception, from an earlier age were mixed with fire. As a boy at the school he was charming and kindliness itself to the smaller boys, and in after life I have often heard my uncle (the late Professor A. R. Cushing, F.R.S., of London University and afterwards Edinburgh) speak of this peculiar charm in one so learned.

His was an ardent nature full of a typically active form of kindliness but his sincerity would at times lead him almost to intransigeance and a touch of intolerance might occasionally stiffen his opposition. He was a gifted writer and possessed to a quite unusual degree the capacity to make a clear and attractive exposition of even a complicated subject; this with his good voice and delivery made him one of the best scientific speakers of his period.

So passes a very charming and distinguished Old Herefordian. The sympathy of all surviving Old Herefordians will go out to Mrs. Boycott and his two sons. R.I.P.

Frederick Cecil Powell (O.H.).

The Rev. Father Frederick Cecil Powell died at Boston, Mass., U.S.A., on the 13th January.

He was the fourth son of the late Rev. Richard Powell, M.A., Rector of Withington, Herefordshire. He was born in 1865 and was thus 73 years of age.

Father Powell was at the School from 1880-1882 and afterwards graduated at Trinity College, Toronto in 1887, being ordained in 1889. He served at Cowley from 1895-1898 and in Capetown from 1898-1900. In 1901 he was in the Church of St. John the Evangelist at Boston Mass., and was received into the Society of St. John the Evangelist at Oxford in 1931.

Rev. James Alfred Bevan (O.H.).

The Rev. J. A. Bevan died at St. Paul's Vicarage, Leytonstone, Essex, on the 3rd February.

He was at the School from 1871-77 and from there went up to St. John's College, Cambridge in 1877. He took his B.A. in 1880 and M.A. in 1891. He was at the London College of Divinity 1886.

Deacon 1888, Priest 1889, Curate of Christ Church Hampstead, 1888-92, Curate of Trinity Church Hampstead 1892-9 and afterwards Vicar of St. Margaret's, Herringfleet 1906-8 and from 1899 Vicar of St. George's, Great Yarmouth until his recent retirement.

He played half back for Cambridge against Oxford in 1877 and the following years of his residence and was awarded his "Blue." He also played for Wales in the first match against England and was thus a Blue and an International.

In the Varsity Match of 1880 a keenly contested struggle ended in a draw of a try each. Incidentally Cambridge should have been returned the winners by a dropped goal—a fact which the famous Oxonian, Harry Vassall, who played in the match, magnanimously records in his article on Oxford Football, when he wrote that Oxford managed to make a draw, thanks to Bevan's dropped goal being disallowed by the Umpires. Vassall says that "it was claimed that the ball had never been put properly in the scrummage, which only meant that the scrummage had not been started in the good old fashioned way. A Cambridge forward had kicked the ball out at once to Don Wanchope who passed to Bevan.

Perhaps the umpires did not see what had happened or perhaps thought it unorthodox play, but we feel certain that any referee of the present day would have allowed the goal to stand."

An article in the "Times" of December 8th, 1931, in describing the match of 1877 and its players and their careers in after life described "J. A. Bevan—Played for Wales in first match v. England. A devoted and hard working clergyman at Yarmouth."

So passes a great sportsman and a true christian.

Rev. W. H. Hornby Steer (O.H.).

The Rev. W. H. Hornby Steer who died suddenly on May 31st at Hampstead was at the School from 1878-1881. He went to St. John's, Cambridge and obtained his B.A. in 1885, taking his M.A. in 1889.

Ordained Deacon in 1886 and Priest in 1888, Canterbury, he became curate of Christchurch, Tunbridge Wells 1886-1892. He was domestic Chaplain to the Countess of Rothe's 1891-3 and afterwards curate of St. Jude's, Kensington 1892-8. He was Vicar of St. Phillips, Lambeth from 1898-1910 and of All Saints, St. Johns Wood from 1910-21. Examining Chaplain to the Bishop of Sodor and Man 1925-1928. He was appointed Chaplain of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in 1925 and held the Order of St. John also the Order of Mercy and was awarded the Territorial Decoration for long service as a Chaplain in 1920.

He was a Licensed Preacher, Diocese of London from 1927, Justice of the Peace for the County of London 1925 and also held high office in the organisation of the League of Mercy.

Hornby Steer was beloved by many for his kindly actions and sympathetic understanding. His influence for good was far-reaching because his practical Christianity was accompanied by an unusual quality that secured for him the confidence and affection of many who did not readily find comfort in the forms and sacraments of the Church which he himself so faithfully served. He was so easy of approach that it was sometimes said that "he was not like an ordinary parson."

At the same time he had a high ideal of the dignity of the ministry and never derogated from the prestige of his calling.

Of Devon descent, Hornby Steer was born at Birkenhead in the year 1856, being the elder son of Philip Steer and Emma, daughter of Rev. William Harrison, M.A.

In 1898 he married Maria Halse Morgan, daughter of William Reed.

Hornby Steer was a collaterial descendant of the famous Bishop Wilson of the diocese of Sodor and Man.

He was the author of "The Seven Gifts, their Meaning and Use" and "Nature's Witness to the Trinity."

He was Chairman of the Childrens' Hospital, Hampstead and one of the few clergymen to be appointed a J.P. for the County of London.

His only son, Mr. W. R. Hornby Steer, is Recorder of South Molton.

He came to several of the London O.H. dinners and his personal charm will be a fragrant memory to those old boys who met him there.

So passes a great Christian gentleman one of the many unknown warriors who set out from Hereford "to leave the world better than they found it."

"Well done thou good and faithful servant."

The sympathy of many Old Herefordians will go out to Mrs. Hornby Steer and his son in their great bereavement.

Engineer Captain Henry Wray Metcalfe, C.B.E., R.N. (O.H.).

Engineer Captain H. W. Metcalfe, R.N., who died at Canterbury, on November 18th, 1937, was the son of Dr. J. W. Metcalfe, the first doctor of the Alpine Club. He was at the School from 1873 to 1877, together with his brother J. G. E. Metcalfe.

The brothers were keenly interested in their old school and on return from abroad attended many of the London O.H. Dinners.

Captain Metcalfe entered the Royal Navy as an engineer student in 1880 and served for 34 years, receiving the C.B.E., in 1919.

During the War he was at the anti-submarine division of the Admiralty. He was the inventor of several service appliances, e.g., revolution indicators—coaling at sea apparatus (Admiralty award).

Responsible for the engineering training of naval officers at Royal Naval College, Osborne, in 1903 under the Selborne-Fisher Scheme for which he received special promotion to Engineer Commander.

Served in Anti-Submarine Division during the Great War as Engineer Captain on the retired list.

Since the war he had taken a keen interest in the British Legion and in local administration, serving 12 years on the Bridge Rural District Council.

He leaves a widow and two daughters to whom the sympathy of many Old Herefordians will go at this time.

His brother "J. G. E." died some years ago, both were charming characters, especially the Captain.

Norman Henry Matthews (O.H.).

Norman Henry Matthews who died on July 15th, 1938 at Cobble Hill, B.C., was at the School from 1898-1906. He rowed in the School crew and obtained his 1st XI Football colours and 2nd XI Cricket. He was a corporal in the cadet corps.

He enlisted in 1915 in the Canadian Mounted Rifles and served in France with the Canadian Light Horse. He was discharged unfit for further service, after being badly wounded in 1918, and returned to Canada.

He was the second son of the late Major N. A. Matthews, T.D., who served in the Herefordshire Volunteers before the War.

Very Rev. J. C. Du Buisson (O.H.).

The Dean of St. Asaph (the Very Rev. J. C. Du Buisson) died at St. Asaph on Thursday, April 17th, after a short illness at the age of 66.

John Clement Du Buisson was the son of the late Rev. Edmund and Mrs. Du Buisson of Breinton, Herefordshire. He was educated at Hereford Cathedral School (1881-1888) and was a demy of Magdalen College Oxford in 1889. Ist Class Mods., 1891, B.A. (2nd Class Lit. Hum.) 1893, 1st Class Theological School 1894, Ellerton Essay and M.A. 1896.

After a period at Cuddeston Theological College he was ordained in 1897 in Chester Cathedral. He was curate of Hawarden, Flintshire 1897-1899. Subwarden Bishop's Hostel, Lincoln 1899-1903 and Warden 1904-1916.

He was a Prebendary of Lincoln 1904-16 and Examining Chaplain to the Bishop of Lincoln 1916-21, and Warden of St. Deniol's Library, Hawarden 1916-1925, Examining Chaplain to the Archbishop of Wales from 1921.

Canon of St. Asaph's Cathedral from 1922 until 1927, when he became Dean, he was the author of a number of books on religious subjects One of the late Dean's greatest tasks was the strenuous part he played during recent years in connection with the raising of £15,000 to save the fabric of St. Asaph Cathedral from collapse, which for some time was seriously threatened, owing to the giving way of the foundations of the tower. In the course of that work he founded the institution known as "The Friends of St. Asaph Cathedral" of which he was Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer.

The Bishop of St. Asaph (Dr. Havard) referring at St. Asaph Cathedral to the death of the Dean (the Very Rev. J. C. Du Buisson) said that not only the Cathedral and the Diocese of St. Asaph but the whole Province of Wales would be the poorer for his passing. He was both a scholar and a saint, whose wise counsel and ripe judgment were invaluable and much sought after. As Dean of the Cathedral he spared no pains in attending to the fabric and the furnishing of the fane he loved so well and to him the beauty, reverence and dignity of the services of the Cathedral were in no small measure due.

The recent restoration of the Cathedral tower was a formidable task which he undertook and completed with that patience, thoughtfulness and quiet confidence which were so characteristic of him. He was shy by nature but his humility was the outward sign of his depth of devotion."

The Cathedral of St. Asaph as it is today is a fitting monument to this distinguished Old Herefordian and he would have wished none better.

George Yeld (O.H.).

On April 2nd, 1938, at Orleton, Gerrards Cross there passed away a grand Old Herefordian, George Yeld, at the age of 93.

Mr. Yeld was at the School from 1859-1863. In 1863 he won a Somerset Scholarship and Philpottine Exhibition to Brasenose College, Oxford, where he gained 2nd Class Classical Mods., 1865, Newdigate English Verse 1866 and 3rd. Class Law and Modern History in 1867.

He was appointed an Assistant Master at St. Peter's School, York in 1868 and remained on the staff for 52 years, the latter half of the time as Second Master.

He was the author of "Scrambles in the Eastern Graian Alps," edited Kingsley's "Andromeda" for Macmillans English series and was joint author of the "Climbers Guide to the Mountains of Cogne."

Editor of "The Alpine Journal" 1896-1919 and Joint Editor 1920-26.

Vice-President of the Alpine Club 1915-17 and Honorary member of the Alpine Club 1919 and of the French and Italian Alpine Clubs.

He was President of the York Branch Historical Association.

Hon. Member Yorkshire Philosophical Society.

A great gardener and lover of flowers he was President of the Iris Society and was awarded the Victoria Medal of Honour of the Horticultural Society.

In the realm of sport he played cricket for the Yorkshire Gentlemen for many years.

In the "Records of Hereford Cathedral School" published in 1931, Mr. Yeld in Appendix VI, page 162, describes what became of the senior boys of his time (1859-63) in after life.

He was particularly proud of his old School and until a few years ago regularly attended the London dinner (on one occasion he was in the chair) where that noble head and long white beard was always a picture which will be a happy memory to many Old Herefordians who now mourn his passing. Our sympathy is with his family.

A charming personality combined with high culture it is indeed a privilege to have known him.

Arthur P. Thomas (O.H.).

Arthur P. Thomas was at Hereford from 1902 to 1905. He was a noted member of both the cricket and soccer elevens, and after leaving he played a considerable amount of first class rugby, appearing for London Welsh, Cardiff and Bridgend, as well as securing a Welsh Trial Cap. He was captain of Bridgend at both football and cricket.

Having qualified as an architect, he found his work interrupted by the War, and after that he was in charge of the property of the Ewenny Estate. It was only recently that he gave up playing for Bridgend cricket club. During the last few years he has proved himself one of our keenest members and has taken the chair at each of the first two South Wales Dinners. He was President and Treasurer of the O.H. Rugger Club. and has also rendered valuable assistance to the School club. The Mercians. who have, for the past two years, undertaken a cricket and a rugger tour of South Wales. He raised a cricket team to play the Mercians in 1937. but his unexpected death in July last prevented his doing so again this Speaking as one who has frequently stayed in his house, I can say that Arthur Thomas was one of the finest sportsmen in the world. He was known to almost everyone in Bridgend by his Christian name, and was probably the most popular man in the district. I feel certain that he would have been bitterly disappointed had he been able to foresee that he was not to live long enough to send his young son to his old school. it was a project of which he frequently spoke, and always with enthusiasm.

RUGBY CLUB NOTES.

The Club is now in its second year. Formed last year, it was intended to be a Welsh Old Boys' Club and so fixtures were arranged in Wales. However, so little assistance was had from Welsh O.H.'s, that, had it not been for a few keen members, the club would have gone out of existence. Owing to these members, the club has continued and is now mainly a Hereford club, with some help from South Wales. The fixture list has been revised, also; we have secured a ground in Hereford, and have more fixtures nearer Hereford. This has considerably reduced the heavy outlay for travelling expenses which was incurred last year. Also, subscriptions from players have come in better this year.

So far six matches have been played, two wins and four defeats being the results. This is already as good as last year's whole record, and we can confidently expect a better season in every way than last, and there is little doubt that the club has come to stay. W. S. Morris is captain once more, N. W. J. Wooldridge vice-captain, E. Rushworth, secretary and N. Watkins, treasurer.

We have, however, three requests to make. First, there are several O.H.'s in and near Hereford who could play for us. We are handicapped by lack of class backs and at present are having to rely on non-O.H.'s. We have accepted the membership of footballers from

other towns who work in Hereford and who wish to play for an Old Boys' side, a practice followed by other schools; but we want O.H.'s with football experience to come and play for us. Secondly, we have increased financial commitments in the shape of ground rent, posts, corner-flags, balls, etc., and although we have raised money by voluntary efforts, we should be pleased if O.H.'s who cannot play can assist us by subscriptions. Thirdly, we can only have our ground for one year, and would welcome the offer of a ground in Hereford from any O.H. who could provide us one. We think that the club deserves it.

THE OLD HEREFORDIAN CRICKET TOUR, 1938.

The cricket tour this year was organised by R. H. Jerrome, and very efficiently he did it. It was most aggravating for him that three members who had promised to turn out failed to do so at the last minute. It was even more aggravating that only one match was not interfered with by rain. On Friday, we were three hours late starting, on Saturday we had a full day, but on Monday a thunderstorm completely flooded the Racecourse so that we had only an hour's play. This happened again on Tuesday, while on Wednesday we could not start until after tea. On Thursday, we did not even start, on Friday we only played for about a couple of hours on a mud heap, and on Saturday we were again delayed, though not so badly as on previous days. On the only reasonable days, we lost to the Falcons and drew with Abergavenny and Panteg. scored 145 against the Falcons and they made the runs for 3 wickets.
